





Outdoor Revolution Camp Star 500XL

Iain Geddes takes a first look at a new-for-2021 family tent bundle from Outdoor Revolution

Sometimes you come across a product that's hard to fault and from my first impressions, the Camp Star 500XL is one of them. It seems to tick all the boxes for easy family camping without having to break the bank.

We pitched on a very windy day, in the usual fashion – by rolling out the whole tent (it pitches as one), pegging down the perimeter of the flysheet and guessing where a few of the windward facing guys would be – pegging out a couple, just in case.

The four tubes in the frame inflate independently with a pump that's supplied with the tent package. Even though we took our time to make sure everything was secure, the tent was pitched in around 15 minutes, a little longer than suggested by Outdoor Revolution but I can believe it could take less than ten minutes on a still day.

The grey of the flysheet may not suit everyone. Perhaps it's my age, but I prefer it to very bold colours that perhaps sit better with festival and expedition tents. The neutral colour doesn't cast an odd hue on things when you're sitting inside.

The air tubes have a subtle pre-bend in them to form a roof profile that offers reasonable standing room throughout, but with enough slope in the sides to help mitigate wind buffeting.

When you're inside there's a lot of window to look out from and a light airy feel. A sewn-in groundsheet is in the central living space and the fitted front porch section has a removable groundsheet, which can be handy when it's a bit wet. The roll-up curtains are easy to use and the side entrance has a

The Camp Star 500XL is supplied with a pump, footprint and carpet, so this sensibly-priced tent is ready to go straight out of the bag.
